

Akshaya Tritiya: 2nd May, 2014

Akshaya Tritiya, also known as Akha Teej, is a holy day for Hindus and Jains. It falls on the third Tithi (lunar day) of Bright Half (Shukla Paksha) of the month of Vaishakha and one of the four most important days for Hindus. The word "Akshaya" means the never diminishing in Sanskrit and the day is believed to bring good luck and success. It is believed that if you do charity on this day you will be blessed. The day is considered auspicious for starting new ventures. The legend is that any venture initiated on the auspicious day of Akshaya Tritiya continues to grow and bring prosperity.



The most popular story regarding the celebration of Akshaya Tritiya is that Lord Karishna and Sudama were friends during their childhood. Sudama was poor and once he went to Krishna to ask him for some financial help as a friend. Sudama didn't have anything else except the pouch of fried rice and he felt ashamed when he gave it to Karishna. But he was overwhelmed by the hospitality shown by Lord Karishna but he couldn't ask his friend for financial support which led him to go home empty-handed. When he arrived at his home he saw that his run-down hut was converted into a palace and his family was wearing royal attire. Sudama knew that this was the blessing of his friend Krishna who blessed him with more wealth than he needed or could ever imagine. This is why Akshaya Tritiya is associated with material gains.

In Hinduism, Akshay Tritiya was the day when Ganesha, the god of wisdom, started writing the epic Mahabharata to Ved Vyas's dictation.

This day is traditionally celebrated as the birthday of the Hindu sage Parashurama, the sixth Avatar of lord Vishnu. According to Hindu tradition, on this day the Treta Yuga began and the river Ganges, the most sacred river of India, descended to the earth from the heaven.

It was on this day that Goddess Annapoorna devi was born. Kubera received his wealth and position as custodian of wealth and property with Goddess Lakshmi on this day, by praying to Lord Shiva. In Mahabharata, Yudhishtira receives the Akshaya patra, which he uses to serve food for all the needy in his kingdom. Goa and Konkan regions, Akshaya Tritiya is considered one of the most sacred days of the year. In Orissa on Akshay Tritiya farmers start ploughing their land and construction of chariots for Rath Yatra begins at Jagannath Puri. In Bengal, on the day of the Akshay Tritiya, "HalKhata" - a ceremony to start the new audit book is performed - with the worship of Ganesha and goddess Lakshmi. This day is most auspicious day for the Jat farming community. Early morning, a male member of a Jat family goes to the field with a shovel. All the animals and birds encountered on the way to the field are omens and predictions for rains and crops. Followers of the Jain religion consider Akshaya Tritiya to be a holy and supremely auspicious day. It is associated with Lord Adinatha, also known as Rishabhadeva, first of the twenty-four Tîrthankaras.



Time to restore dignity of Prime Minister, credibility of PMO and integrity of constitution!

People are coming out of their homes and voting in large numbers. While it is a triumph of democracy where participation of voters has increased heavily, high turnout indicates the yearning for change. People want to see change, they are now not willing to tolerate the hopeless situation in which they are forced to remain under the Congress led UPA government. Urban and rural voters, male and female, new voters and older ones, almost everyone is coming out to exercise their franchise, their right to elect a government which can take India to new heights. "Abki bar – Modi Sarkar" and "Modi aane wala hai" are the songs which have made their place in the hearts of the people. The lyrics of the song "Yeh desh nahi jhukne dunga, yeh desh nahi mitne dunga" is instilling new confidence in the younger generation who are now viewing this election as a fight against corruption, misrule and policy paralysis. An atmosphere of hope has created new fervor strengthening the spirit of democracy while kindling new aspirations in the hearts of millions of people.

While nation is busy electing its new government, two books which have hit the stand have shocked the nation. What was hitherto considered political accusations despite BJP leaders raising it with all sincerity, have become established facts so far as the content of these books are concerned. "The Accidental Prime Minister: Making and Unmaking of Manmohan Singh", a book written by Sanjay Baru, former media advisor of Dr. Manmohan Singh makes startling revelations about the manner in which PMO functioned during UPA-I government. In his tell-all memoir of his days in PMO, Sanjay Baru confirms the overpowerings control that Sonia Gandhi enjoyed in the PMO through one Pulok Chatterjee, who was appointed at her behest and used to brief her daily and seek her directions in important matters. Baru's observation that "Sonia Gandhi's renunciation of power was more of a political tactic than a response to a higher calling" speaks volumes of the double standard that Congress indulges in to cling to the power at any cost. It was an open secret that Prime Minster was in office but without having any power, even without the power to choose his cabinet or to allocate portfolios. The power vested in Sonia Gandhi who became an extra constitutional authority exercising her influence through her handpicked coterie in the PMO and in the name of National Advisory Council. In fact all these revelations are only confirmation of what has already been in the public domain.

"Crusader or Conspirator? Coalgate and other Truths" authored by former Coal Secretary PC Parakh reinforces the image of Dr. Manmohan Singh as weak Prime Minister having no authority over his cabinet. Parakh who resigned as Coal Secretary observed "By continuing to head a government in which he had little political authority, his image has been seriously dented by 2G scam and coalgate." These two books which are in fact memoirs clearly indicate that national interest was at risk while extra constitutional power centre was ruling the roost. These revelations are serious in nature as these are brought into the public domain by the people who were in responsible positions and one time confidants of the Prime Minister Dr. Manmohan Singh. These memoirs are in fact insider accounts of the real situation that prevailed in the PMO.

The country is paying the price of extra constitutional authority controlling the

PMO while reducing the Prime Minister to a mere figurehead. Earlier it was often complained that the 'diarchy' or "Double Power Centre" was pushing the nation to a regime of policy paralysis, loot and plunder of public money and unprecedented price rise. But this impression now needs to be corrected, it was not two power centres but single power centre which was extraconstitutional and enjoyed by Congress President Sonia Gandhi. In fact Dr. Manmohan Singh had no power at all, he exercised no authority. All the powers were vested in Sonia Gandhi who controlled the PMO and rendered the constitutional office of Prime Minister ineffective. It was the biggest fraud committed on the people who are determined to throw the Congress led government out of power.

Time has come to restore the dignity of the post of Prime Minister, the credibility of PMO and integrity of constitution. The last decade of misrule has shown us how the people are made to pay if constitution is undermined and constitutional authorities are humiliated. The extra constitutional authority combined with a weak Prime Minster has played havoc with the country. It cannot be allowed to continue. People have made up their mind. They are coming out in large numbers to overthrow this extra-constitutional authority established through fraud and deceit. People have expressed their mind overwhelmingly in

spoke of how the Congress had misled the Nation by creating a Nirbhaya Fund of Rs. 1000 crore, but has not used a penny out of it till date.

Stating that the Congress' only focus was on divisive and destructive politics, Shri Modi cited how

the division of Telangana and Seemandhra had only brought further ruin and misery for the people of these states. Referring to a similar step taken by the Assam government, and in context of the violence witnessed in the State due to conflicts between Bodos and non-Bodos, Shri Modi said, "Bodo and non-Bodo people are being divided by the Congress only for their own gains. They should take everyone

together," said Shri Modi.

Shri Modi spoke of how the Assam CM would spread one lie everyday, and stated how a TV channel recently had exposed the lack of basic amenities in the region. "News Time Assam actually came to Gujarat to verify the lies your CM said and they opened the eyes of the people of Assam," said Shri Modi.

He also spoke on other pertinent issues of infiltration from the borders, the need to protect natural resources and the much-required focus on ensuring education and skill development to the youth.

A change in government will change the lives of people

n 18th April, Shri Narendra Modi addressed massive rallies at Etawah and Kanpur in Uttar Pradesh and affirmed that the time had come to free the State from the misrule of the Samajwadi Party in State and the Congress at the Centre.

Taking a dig at Samajwadi Party chief Shri Mulayam Singh Yadav, Shri Modi said how 'Netaji' was unable to take a stand where required. He stated



that the SP chief would go 'mulayam' (soft) when required to be tough, and vice-versa, and cited how during the recent riots, 'Netaji' had failed miserably in consoling the kin of those who had lost their lives.

Giving an example of the misplaced priorities of the SP and BSP Shri Modi said, "Some are busy in building Elephant Parks and some are on Lion Safari. Sadly, there is no one to worry about the people of UP." He also recalled how UP had asked for lions from Gujarat, and added that he would have been more happy in giving the cows from Gir too, so that the suffering cattle-rearers of UP could benefit.

Talking further on the misgovernance of the State government, Shri Modi spoke of how, on one hand, sugarcane farmers in the State were distressed over inadequate payment for their produce, and on the other, poor people too had to carry guns for their safety. "Why are people having to starve but spend money to buy guns in UP? Why aren't people protected here. Law & order

must be maintained," said Shri Modi, as he called for the need to tackle the rising crime rate in the State.

Shri Modi also criticized the Congress' inability to empathize with the poor, and said that for them 'poverty' and the 'homes of the poor' was a source of tourism and an attempt at attention-grabbing. Shri Modi recalled his childhood days as a tea-seller and affirmed that he very well understood what living in poverty meant. He assured that working for the poor and marginalized sections of the society would be a key concern for the BIP, after it wins.

Citing the recent media reports exposing the IT raids conducted at a meat exporting company, Shri Modi spoke of how reports claimed that the dealings were a big Hawala racket, with the involvement of 4 Central government ministers and a leader close to 10 Janpath.

Bless BJP so that BJP can transform India

Addressing the 'Bharat Vijay rallies' in Betul and Chhegaon Makhan, Madhya Pradesh, on 18th April, 2014, Shri Narendra Modi affirmed that the only way to save the Nation from the corrupt policies of the Congress, was by voting for

He highlighted local issues ranging from job creation to improving the local economies and presented his vision on how the NDA would solve these issues.

In the name of environment all projects were stalled and Jayanti Tax was being imposed. However, this 'Green' was not about trees but about currency," said Shri Modi.

Shri Modi also condemned the game of politics played by the DMK and AIADMK, wherein they took turns to rule the State and simply ruin its resources rather than working for the progress of its people. "Till TN is not freed from these 2 main parties the interest of the people will not be served," said Shri Modi.

Highlighting the vast potential of Erode's burgeoning textile industry, Shri Modi stated that the city, with its cotton-dyeing, colouring and handloom sectors, could well become the textile heaven of India, and with the right infrastructure

linkages, could prosper and give employment to many youth.

Shri Modi appreciated the hard work of farmers of Erode, and acknowledged how this had contributed to making their produce preferred across the country, especially spices like turmeric.

Shri Modi also spoke of how the Centre's regressive policies had brought the market of the very popular Sivakasi crackers to a near-end, and



given the crackers from China an opportunity to capture the local market.

In Kanyakumari, Shri Modi spoke of the tremendous tourism prospects for the region, and stated how a double-line railway between Kanyakumari and Tamil Nadu could give a massive boost to the influx of tourists. "Scope of development in TN is immense. Kanyakumari alone can play such a big role. We can make such a Kanyakumari that the entire India will come here. Speaking on how unemployment remains a big concern in Tamil Nadu, Shri Modi quoted figures which proved that the employment exchange of TN had given opportunities to negligible number of youth in the past. He cited Gujarat's efforts at empowering the youth through skill development and employment generation, and

assured that the focus for BJP was on good governance and development, and thereby enable job creation. "We will reorient the economy in a way that job creation will be at the centre. BJP led NDA will secure 300 Lok Sabha seats: Rajnath Singh

By Partial President Shri Rajnath Singh on 19 April, 2014 ruled out the possibility of a post-poll alliance and exuded confidence that the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) would secure 300 Lok Sabha seats.

Interacting with media persons ahead of an election rally at Thanjavur in Tamil Nadu, he said,



"We are fully confident that the BJP-led NDA will cross this magic number — 272. We expect that the NDA will get approximately 300 Lok Sabha seats," he said.

Asked about the comparison of development in Tamil Nadu and the Gujarat, Shri Rajnath said the Gujarat development was not a myth because the Rajiv Gandhi Foundation headed by Smt. Sonia Gandhi appreciated the developments in Gujarat in 2008.

He said the BJP-led NDA alliance had emerged as a major political force in the state. "In Tamil Nadu, the political power has been changing hands between the DMK

and the AIADMK. Now, the BJP-led NDA with five political parties has emerged as a major political force in Tamil Nadu. Definitely, this alliance will provide an alternative to the people of Tamil Nadu and the alliance will win 20 seats in the state," Shri Rajnath Singh said.

He accused both the DMK and the AIADMK of indulging in

political vendetta. He said both parties were not concerned about state's the development. "Due lack development in Tamil Nadu, unemployment is very high. There is no room for good governance and development because the DMK and the AIADMK believe in vendetta. Until Tamil Nadu is freed from

clutches of the DMK and the AIADMK, the people in the state will continue to suffer," he said.

On Jayalalithaa's recent accusation that the BJP was biased on the Cauvery issue, he said the issue would be resolved by dialogue between Tamil Nadu and Karnataka.

Opinion polls show NDA will win 275 seats

DTV's opinion polls, 'The Final Word', claim that NDA will win 275 seats, crossing the half-way mark of 272 with a comfortable majority. BJP's share of the tally is expected to be 226 seats with the rest coming in from allies — old and new — such as Telugu Desam Party.

The UPA is supposed to lose out badly with just 111 seats for the coalition and a mere 92 for Congress, probably its worst performance.


Almost all the opinion surveys so far have come up with similar results in favour of NDA, but the last two by CNN-IBN and NDTV have been rather categorical in announcing BJP as the clear winner while polling is still on.

The prediction of a BJP victory is based on the assumption that it will do exceedingly well in the Hindi heartland. For instance, the channel has claimed that BJP will win 51 out of the total 80 seats in UP, and along with its allies it will bag 24 out of the 40 seats in Bihar.

NDA's gains in the second most electorally important state of Maharashtra would also be substantial: 37 out of the 48 seats, according to the channel's pollsters.

BJP is expected to sweep Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan and Chhattisgarh. But the surprise victories are predicted from Odisha, Seemandhra region of Andhra Pradesh, Telangana and a considerable share of seats in Karnataka.

The pollsters have projected a tally of 15 out of 25 Seemandhra seats, three out of 17 in Telangana and seven out of 21 in Odisha for BJP and its allies. They claim the party will win about 12 seats in Karnataka.

In fact, the regional parties are lesser sinners in this sordid game. The ball was set rolling by the Congress a long time ago. The Rajiv Gandhi Government's decision to overturn the Supreme Court judgement in the Shah Bano case in 1986 stoked the flames of communal politics in the country.

More recently, Prime Minister Manmohan Singh's infamous statement that Muslims have the first claim on national resources — obviously a crude and unabashed attempt to reclaim the minority vote-bank for his party — was in line with the trend set by Rajiv Gandhi.

The Congress has lost its electoral sheen, thanks to massive corruption, inflation and the manner in which it has compromised the security of the country and demeaned the office of the Prime Minister. No wonder the electorate is disenchanted with the Congress and Congressmen can read the writing on the wall. To make up for the loss of public support, they are falling back on their old war cry: "Secularism is in danger".

The entire political establishment wears the lapel of 'secularism'. Its daily discourse in this election campaign has revolved around the communal touchstone. The 'secular' campaign starts with the dubbing of whatever the BJP or its leader Narendra Modi says,

in communal-secular terms.

Even a cursory look at the reports from Varanasi reveals how the anti-BJP forces from the Congress, the Bahujan Samaj Party and the Samajwadi Party view everything from this angle. Phrases like 'polarisation of the electorate' have become the daily chant of the anti-BJP camp members.

They ask: Why is Mr Modi contesting from Varanasi? They answer: It is to polarise voters. Why is the BJP giving so much importance to Varanasi? It is to polarise Hindu votes. It goes on like this, with our 'secular' politicians seeing communalism at every step.

Equally unfortunate is the inability of senior leaders of all parties to keep the election rhetoric within bounds. The BJP's Murli Manohar Joshi perhaps spoke for many even outside his party when he appealed that "all senior leaders should show restraint while speaking in public and choose their words carefully". Election Commission member HC Brahma has called the 2014 campaign the "worst" in the past 30 years that he has been conducting elections, as a Government officer at various places and now as a regulator. The exercise of choosing a leader can never be a one-horse race if it is to be meaningful.

Also the task of governing, after the noise has settled and the grind of fulfilling the promises has begun, requires a high degree of accommodation between the different political parties who will adorn the benches in the two Houses of Parliament.

When the Rajiv Gandhi Government found itself unable to run Parliament, despite its two-thirds majority in the Lok Sabha, it was a warning for many future Governments. Prime Minister PV Narasimha Rao, on the other hand, was able to steer the Government for a full five-year term even though he headed a minority dispensation.

regime had a wider mandate when it came back to power in 2009 with more than 200 seats in the Lok Sabha, as compared to its smaller strength in 2004. Yet it could not achieve consensus in its second term like it had done the first time. For all political parties, these are pointers on how to run a Government irrespective of the majority or minority numbers.

As some analysts have pointed out, the UPA2's failure was largely due to the regime losing its moral authority — both within and outside Parliament. The same could have also been said about Rajiv Gandhi's Government before and after the Bofors scandal.For Prime Minister Singh, otherwise a

much-respected economist, the moral authority was lost within a year of re-election after the 2G scam broke. Despite being aware of the controversy around the mis-allocation of 2G spectrum licences by the DMK's A Raja, Mr Singh did not put his foot down.

There is no need to go to the pre-poll opinion surveys to get the feel of Congress's absolute inability to inspire the people's confidence in its governance record. It is because of this countrywide loss of credibility that the Congress, which has won large majorities in the last 65 years, will, in a best case scenario, sit in Lok Sabha with just around 100 MPs.

No wonder, the panic in the party is showing in the language of its leaders who are pushing the single-point agenda of secularism. The other day, a Muslim cleric said it well when he listed hundreds of riots that have taken place under the Congress's rule over the decades, including the demolition of houses of worship. He also listed the promises to his community that the party had made but not fulfilled. The loss of credibility for the Congress is across the board. Even the community it claims it wants to save is rejecting its hand of help. ■

### Fight Black Money at home and abroad

n March 26, the Supreme Court rejected the Union Government's plea to recall the court's order to set up a Special Investigation Team, headed by its two former judges, to monitor investigations relating to black money and the flight of unaccounted amounts to foreign banks.

The court also slammed successive Governments at the Centre for "doing nothing to bring back the black money stashed away in tax havens abroad". Indeed, it was only after six decades of independence, that at least one citizen came forward, in 2011, and complained that the Indian economy was being destroyed due to black money park in tax havens abroad.

The court said: "There will be a body (SIT) because you have failed. Were you not aware where the black money is deposited? You know it very well... Even if you have taken steps, this court being the highest court and the constitutional court can pass such an order".

The Government has a number of agencies to deal with the problem of black money, like the Directorate General of Economic Enforcement, the Directorate of Revenue Intelligence and the office of the Chief Commissioner of Income Tax and even the Central Bureau of Investigations. But they are all parts of the larger Government machinery, and most of them cannot act on their own.

There is talk about bringing back Indian funds illegally stashed in foreign banks. But what about the dirty money floating inside the local economy, particularly in sectors such as real estate?

For instance, the CBI has to take permission from the Union Government before starting an inquiry against officers of the level of Joint Secretary and above. In 2013, the Union Cabinet has passed a resolution extending this shield to retired officials from the above ranks as well.

Politicians often think that the people are fools and the electorate does not see through their empty promises. One example of this is the announcement by the Congress that it will appoint a special envoy to track black money. But the Congress-led Government at the Centre has done little with the information it received regarding people who have stashed black money abroad. This is despite the fact that it has people from the Revenue and Intelligence services posted abroad in important Indian Embassies. Surely, they are doing some work.

Apart from black money hidden in foreign shores, there

is also black money floating around inside the country. It is commonly known that almost nothing moves in the Government before the palms of bureaucrats are greased at all levels. This brings us to the question: What is the point of wasting time in requesting other countries to cooperate with India on the black money issue when we will do so little to resolve the issue at home?

Take, for instance, property transactions. Having taken a Government loan of Rs80,000 in 1977 and another of Rs40,000 from an IAS/IPS cooperative society, I built a house in Bangalore. I wanted to sell it before retirement, as I was keen on settling down in either Punjab or Delhi. When I received an offer of Rs1.40 crore, I promptly agreed to the sale. But the buyer said he would pay one crore in cash and only Rs40 lakh by cheque. Without a second thought, I rejected the deal and said that I would take everything by cheque and pay all taxes.

He was surprised and tried to persuade me to change my mind, but I was clear that I would not touch black money and ensure that every tax penny goes into the Government treasury. When he persisted, I shared with him an Urdu proverb: "Kya is umar hum khaak mussalman honge!" (I cannot convert to some other ideology or religion at this age). Eventually, I had to wait for two years before I sold the house to a nationalised bank for

Rs73 lakh which was half the market price — and I still had to pay taxes on the transaction. Such stories are the norm in the real estate world.

The Government has to create an atmosphere in the country wherein there is no need to bribe others to get legitimate work done. Passing new laws here is not the solution as they Recently, I asked a businessman why he generates black money and does not pay taxes. He told me that he needs to pay bribes to get his work done, and nobody accepts bribes in cheque! There are several such examples across the country. No wonder, corruption in India has become a major issue that adversely affects the economy.

only create new bottlenecks and clog the process of business.

Also, the Government has to be willing to investigate its own bureaucrats, as the latter generate much black money from their corrupt practices. When I joined the Indian Police Service, I used to walk to my police station in Mysore, as even at the level of Assistant Superintendent of Police Probationer, my salary was not enough even to purchase a bicycle.

I had to hire my first cycle for Rs10 per month, and even that was difficult to maintain as my salary was only Rs350 per month. Later, I purchased a cycle for which I had to make a Rs50 down-payment and paid the rest with Rs15 over 10 months. Today, even Class Four employees believe that it is beneath their dignity to walk to work or travel by public transport.

Occasionally, after prodding by the apex court, the Government gives the impression that it is tackling the problem. But the matter is forgotten till the next date of hearing. The Government must remember that good governance cannot be imported from outside. It has to take up cudgels on behalf of the people and ensure the effective delivery of services.

People need answer from Congress: Nirmala Sitharaman



- Did the PM knowingly overlook corruption by his colleagues as alleged in the book. 2G, CWG and Coalgate happened because of this? ■

I believe in delegation, decentralization and empowerment : Narendra Modi

As the largest democracy of the world votes to elect its new government, people are eager to know the policies and programmes of BJP. Recently representatives of Economic Times have talked to BJP Prime Ministerial candidate Shri Narendra Modi on a range of issues, from political to economic. Emphasizing a stable policy framework he said that



credibility, clarity and continuity is required as the economy has dipped further under Congress led UPA government and a mood of pessimism prevails in the country. He said that he believes in Team work and the concept of delegation, decentralization and empowerment. Excerpts:

If you win, you will inherit a sickly economy. A new government will have short-term pressures to lift investor mood and medium-term pressure to lift actual investment. What are your plans for these most critical areas?

I agree that the new government will inherit an economy in a very bad shape. I do not know whether it was by design that the UPA government has left the economy in a shape that is worse than ever before. Probably, it is the Congress' way of making it difficult for successor governments to work. The NDA government had demitted office in 2004 leaving the GDP growth rate in excess of 8.5%. India was poised to attain double digit growth rate and the economy looked in great shape with inflation being under control. UPA has mismanaged the economy.

When UPA is going out of power, the GDP growth rate has gone down to 4.5%, inflation is at an all-time high and the mood is of pessimism.

As far as perception-related issues are concerned, thankfully we have our track record to fall back upon. Therefore, it would be much easier to handle perception-related issues. We will

have to immediately get on the job and come out of the present state of policy paralysis and lack of decision-making.

We are very clear that we want a government that does not shy away from taking decisions. We would like a stable policy framework and whatever incentives and tax structures are there should be made known to investors upfront. There should be credibility, clarity and continuity in both policy formulation and its implementation.

You are perceived to be investor-friendly. However, your party is opposed to big reforms such as FDI in multi-brand retail. Don't you think this will depress foreign investor sentiments? What happens to companies like Tesco, whose JV with the Tatas has already been approved by the Centre?

While we have expressed our reservations on FDI in multi-brand retail, our party manifesto is very clear that we welcome FDI in all sectors. Wherever we think that FDI can help in generating jobs for the youth and growth in employment, we will encourage the same. As regards individual cases, any decision will

depend upon the merits of the case as revealed by its details. However, we are equally committed to take care of investor sentiments and to ensure that we do not send any message of uncertainty and lack of continuity in decision-making process which is likely to adversely impact the confidence of investors in general and foreign investors in particular.

You have said you don't believe in 100 days performance targets. But first perceptions are important. How do you plan to make your first perception?

I don't think with my own track record of more than 12 years as the chief minister of a strong and vibrant state and the track record of the six years of NDA rule, I am under much of a pressure of perception management.

Central policy has many stakeholders and vested interests. What are your plans to tackle this, do you have any fundamental reform in mind? You have said there has to be a Team India, one office can't run the country — how will you create that Team India?

I think the Team India is already there. As a chief minister, I have experienced first hand the problems that the state governments face visa-vis the Centre. I fully understand the expectations of the state governments. Thus, I am better placed to work closely with the chief ministers.

I also believe in delegation, decentralisation and empowerment. We should work with the principle that a work that can be done at a lower level should never be escalated to a higher level.

On land issues, the Centre has much less freedom — will you make a special effort to clear up the land for industry? If so, how?

As of now, it is the states who are taking the lead in implementation of projects and bringing about growth and development. The Centre in the last 10 years has only ended up delaying projects on one or the other pretext. Apart from an all-pervasive policy paralysis coupled with a lack of decision-making ability, it has also been large-scale corruption in the guise of environment protection which has been responsible for project delays. If the Centre

can become a facilitator, then a healthy competition between the states is going to take care of issues related to project implementation.

Regarding the issue of land for industry, we are very clear that a win-win solution is possible and industrial investment need not come at the cost of sacrificing the interest of farmers. Right now we are having a situation wherein due to procedural delays the farmers are not getting adequate and timely compensation and the projects are also not taking off in time, leading to project delays and cost overruns.

So it is a lose-lose situation today. This is due to the Congress party's belief in symbolism and lip service to the interest of farmers.

We will move towards the system of speedy and more transparent process where the first priority will be to give adequate compensation to the farmers to their satisfaction and protecting the interest of the farmers. At the same time, there will be equal emphasis on time-bound project implementation.

I seriously think that in the end the additional amount paid to the farmers on enhanced compensation will be less than the money saved by timely implementation of projects.

Relations between BJP and Congress have nosedived, but won't you need Congress to get Parliament to support policy-making? Do you plan to reach out if and when you are in power?

I do not think it is a correct assessment that the relations between BJP and Congress have nosedived. It is natural during elections for pitched battles to be fought. In the last 10 years, the BJP has supported several initiatives of the Congress; be it the Food Security Bill or the Land Acquisition Bill, Lokpal Bill, Telangana etc. Today, all mature politicians understand the importance of working together on issues of vital national importance.

We hear that if you win you plan to run a smaller government. If that's true, how small will your government be... Do you have a finance minister on mind?

I think these questions are premature. It would be appropriate that we wait till 16th May before

getting into these discussions.

How will a Modi government be different from earlier ones? How will your cabinet be different? Will you go for a government of technocrats?

Again, let's wait till 16th May.

We also hear you want the Centre to focus only on areas listed out in the central list, while leaving the states to work on the states list. Will you please elaborate?

I have been a firm believer in the federal structure of our country as enshrined in the Constitution.

While any BJP-led government will never do anything to trample upon the authority of the states, we would also not shy away from our responsibility to play a role in coordinating the efforts of the states wherever needed.

Cabinet ministers frequently underperform and PMs frequently look helpless when they underperform. Will you set targets for ministers, set goals and hold ministers accountable?

As I have said, I believe in team work and collective responsibility. I believe that all the members of a team should be given specific responsibilities and empowered to discharge those responsibilities.

Needless to say, accountability has to be there in any such arrangement and it also includes me. When we work as a team, every member including the captain has to be accountable to the team. Further, in democracy ultimate accountability is to the people.

You have had difficult relationships with other countries after 2002, especially with the US. Will you travel to the US ever?

These are all figments of the imagination of certain people. I have always had the best relations with various countries. In fact, more than 100 countries participated in the last Vibrant Gujarat Investors Summit-2013. In any case, I am clear that issues between countries are far too important to be even remotely influenced by individuals or events.

How many seats will BJP win this poll as per your assessment?

This is an unprecedented election we are seeing.

In every way this election is going to be difficult to predict even for psephologists. However, I have travelled the length and breadth of the country and the tremendous groundswell of support that I have seen makes me confident about a few things.

Firstly, this election we are going to see the highest turnout and the largest participation of young voters.

Secondly, the sentiment against the Congress party is very strong. The Congress party is not only staring at a certain defeat, but also going to fall to its lowest tally in independent India's electoral history. I would not be surprised if the Congress fails to attain double digit score in any state and almost certainly it is not going to reach the triple figure mark nationally.

Thirdly, this is the first election in which antiincumbency feeling is present along with overwhelming positive vote for change. Thus, I see the BJP and the NDA both achieving their best performances ever. Now, it is almost certain that the pre-poll alliance of NDA will get a clear majority.

What is Narendra Modi the person like? What motivates him, what does he dislike? What does he want to be remembered for?

You can call me a workaholic. It is most often working and the possibility of positively impacting the lives of millions which motivates me. I am stickler for punctuality and discipline. Therefore, at times I don't like it when my schedules get delayed.

It is probably too early in the day for me to be thinking about what I would like to be remembered for.

You have been critical in your speeches about Manmohan Singh.. Is there anything that you would give him credit for?

I would certainly give Dr Manmohan Singh a lot of credit for the work he did as finance minister in the Narasimha Rao government. Even as prime minister, he may have been able to do some good work had he been given the authority and independence to function.

That, however, is in the realm of history now. I certainly respect him as an individual. ■

People come out in large numbers to elect new Government

The nine phases vote- the longest election in the country's history- in 16th Lok Sabha election began on 7th April 2014 and will conclude on 12 may. In this 2014 general election, the electoral population

is 81.45 crores, the largest in the world. There is an increase of 10 crores newly eligible voters. This also will be the longest and the most expensive general election in the history of the country with the Election Commission of India estimating that the election will cost the exchequer INR 35 billion, excluding the expenses incurred for security and individual political parties.

The first five phases of polling in the lok Sabha saw a significant rise in voter turnout.

According to final figures released by the Election Commission (EC) on April 16, there was an 8 percentage point increase in turnout in the 111 constituencies that went to polls on April 7, 9, 10 and 12, compared to turnout at the same constituencies in the 2009 general elections.

While the total aggregate turnout for these constituencies in the ongoing polls was 68.29%, the figure stood at 60.39% for the same set of constituencies in 2009. Turnout in 11 of the 13 states and union territories

where polling is complete saw an increase from 2009. These include Goa, Delhi, Haryana, Kerala and Chandigarh.

Goa, Tripura and Chandigarh have registered their highest turnout ever. The only

saw an increase of 28.81% in the total absolute numbers of voters.

The highest increase in turnout was for Goa at 76.83%, a jump of more than 20 percentage points from the last general election. The state registered



two states where the polling is complete but which registered a lower turnout are Meghalaya and Sikkim.

Political analysts say the high turnout could be because of young voters – 52% of the 814 million-strong electorate is 18-to-40 years old.

According to EC Northeastern states, including Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya and Sikkim, as well as Goa, Chandigarh and Lakshadweep saw more women vote than men.

The first four phases also

turnouts of 58.77% in 2004 and 55.28% in 2009.

Delhi, whose voters are often portrayed as apolitical and apathetic to elections, registered a turnout of 65.09% as opposed to the 51.85% in the 2009 Lok Sabha elections and a dismal 47.09% in 2004. In Haryana too, the final turnout was 71.86% in comparison to 67.49% and 65.72% in 2009 and 2004 Lok Sabha elections.

India's total voter turnout was under 60% in the past two general elections – 58.19% in

2009 and 58.07% in 2004.

The 5th Phase was biggest of the nine-phased Lok Sabha polls was held in 12 states covered 121 constituencies. While there was nearly 79 per cent polling in rural districts of West Bengal, around 65 per cent polling was recorded in Karnataka. The IT hub Bangalore saw just above 50 per cent polling. The Karnataka capital didn't even have bad weather conditions, pointing to voter apathy in the city's four seats.

An estimated 65 per cent of the 4.62 crore voters in Karnataka exercised their franchise on April 17 for 28 Lok Sabha seats in the single-phase polls. Nearly 79 per cent votes were cast at the close of polling in the first of the five-phase Lok Sabha elections West Bengal, which determined the electoral fate of candidates. The constituencies in Maharashtra where polling was held on April 17 in the second phase of Lok Sabha elections in the state recorded an average 61.7 per cent turnout. Around 62 per cent of the electorate voted in the second phase of polling in six Lok Sabha seats in Uttar Pradesh. 54 per cent votes were cast in seven parliamentary seats in Bihar.A maximum 54 per cent voting was recorded in Buxar and Jehanabad Lok Sabha seats. Around 62 per cent of the electorate voted in the second phase of polling in six Lok Sabha seats in Jharkhand amid Maoist violence that left five persons, including 4 CRPF men, injured. Around 65 per cent voter turnout was recorded in three Naxal-hit Lok Sabha constituencies of Chhattisgarh where Maoists targeted a polling team but there was no casualty. An estimated 70 per cent voters exercised their franchise for the simultaneous second and last phase of the elections to 11 Lok Sabha and 77 assembly constituencies in Odisha on April 17. A moderate 54.41 per cent polling was recorded in Madhya Pradesh for ten Lok Sabha seats amid rains, intense heat conditions and poll boycott in some villages. First phase of polling in 20 Lok Sabha

constituencies in Rajasthan ended with 63 per cent voter turnout. In Manipur Inner constituency, the turnout was an impressive 80 per cent and it was likely to go up further.

Udhampur Lok Sabha constituency in Jammu and Kashmir recorded over 69 per cent polling

The elections will see the remaining voting take place on 24 April, 30 April, 7 May and 12 May. ■

## Why the rush on Lokpal appointments, asks BJP

The BJP has launched a scathing attack on the United Progressive Alliance government's attempt to appoint the first Lokpal, calling it a violation of the Election Commission's Model Code of Conduct. Meanwhile the party had also written to the Election Commission asking that the process be halted. Shri R. Ramakrishna, National Convener, BJP Election Cell, wrote to the EC, asking Election Commissioner V. Sampath to put on hold all major appointments until a new government was formed.

In a letter Shri Ramakrishna maintained that government was trying to hurry major appointments during the elections and cited the case of the new Naval chief's appointment. "We learn that something similar is cooking in respect of the Army chief, where the present incumbent is due to superannuate in July, 2014. We also hear that there is some hurried activity in hastening the selection process of the Lokpal. It may be recalled the process of selection got aborted by the exit of the eminent jurists and as such the whole selection process currently stands vitiated. These are not desirable trends in a healthy democracy," Shri Ramakrishna said.

The EC on Sunday could not confirm receipt of the letter and had no decision to announce. Prime Minister Manmohan Singh had written to members of the Selection Committee on April 11, asking if they were available to meet in the last week of April.

Meanwhile, Leader of Opposition in Rajya Sabha Shri Arun Jaitley asked if it was proper for the UPA "on the eve of its departure" to rush through the appointment of the Lokpal.

### The Importance of Understanding

hen Gurudev formed his forest university, he called it the Yoga-Vedanta Forest University. He wanted both Yoga and Vedanta to be taught—Vedanta primarily being the philosophy, Yoga primarily being the practice. However, in his teachings, Gurudev concentrated primarily

on practice or doing. Indeed, he didn't have too much patience with those who spent too much time on philosophy; sometimes he referred to them as dry-Vedantins.

So too with us. The important thing is to practice, not spend too much time on philosophy. And yet Gurudev did call it Yoga-Vedanta, because there is also an importance in developing our understanding, even if it seems somewhat esoteric and unnecessary compared to our normal practices. Because the truth is, unless

we develop some understanding of what we're seeking, even if we discover it, we won't likely be able to recognise it.

Therefore, every morning when he comes here, while Pujya Swami Chidanandaji always ends up by telling us to do some practical Yoga, he always begins by offering worshipful homage to the Supreme Reality. In other words, he lifts our minds up to That which is beyond our minds. And frequently in offering worshipful homage he describes

the Supreme as unknowable and unthinkable. Therefore, our first understanding must be that what we are is, in the final analysis, unknowable, ungraspable to the mind.

What is it then that we can know about God? Brahman is described as Existence-Consciousness-Bliss. God we



cannot know, but we can be aware of our existence. We know that we exist, or we say "I am." And Swamiji has told us that there is no harm in "I am." Hold on to your existence. It is only after "I am" that we get into trouble. The problem is when we identify with lower forms and forget our sense of pure existence.

This unfortunately is our plight. We who are ultimately unknowable, we who can know ourselves as Existence-Consciousness-Bliss, have lost

ourselves in identification with a body and mind. What is the purpose of understanding this? It is to recognise that the purpose of all our spiritual practices is to lead us back to that sense of existence, that sense of pure "I am" or the conscious presence.

Therefore, we should ask ourselves the question, "When I am repeating God's name, am I getting that sense of Pure Existence?" We probably are, but it is not recognised, and so we just repeat God's name mechanically without recognising that its purpose is to lead us back to our sense of existence.

This is the purpose of all our spiritual practices. When we're studying Vedanta, it isn't just to add more information to our brain, but rather to recognise the pure existence that it is trying to show us. Ramana Maharshi said that the enquiry of Who am I? is a pertroute back to our sense of

direct route back to our sense of existence, our sense of "I am."

Therefore, while both Gurudev and Swamiji want us to concentrate on doing, on our practices, it is important to recognise what their purpose is, which is to lead us back to our sense of existence, our sense of "I am." And it is from that point that we can ultimately recognise our true source, which is beyond words, beyond thoughts, but is the Reality.
